RESOLUTION NO. 22-50 for the Destruction or Control of NOX-IOUS WEEDS

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of

County, Iowa That pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 317 of the 2021 Code of

lowa, it is hereby ordered: 1. That each owner and each person in the possession or control of any lands in Winneshiek County shall properly spray, cut, burn, or otherwise destroy or control all noxious weeds thereon, as defined in this chapter, at such time in each year and in such manner as shall prevent said weeds from blooming or coming to maturity, and shall keep said lands free from such growth of any other weeds as shall

on or before the following dates and as often thereafter as it is necessary to prevent seed production. PRIMARY NOXIOUS WEEDS: June 15, 2022 for musk thistle, quack grass, perennial sow thistle, Canada thistle, bull thistle, field bindweed, horse nettle, leafy

puncture vine, teasle and shatter-2. That each owner and each person in the possession or control of land in Winneshiek County infested with any noxious weeds including perennial sow thistle, bull thistle field bindweed, horse nettle, quack grass, leafy spurge, perennial pepper-grass, Russian knapweed, poison hemlock, wild sunflower and teasel, shall adopt a program of weed destruction, described by the Weed Commissioner which in five years may be expected to destroy and will immediately keep under control such infestations of said

noxious weeds. 3. That if the owners or persons in possession or control of any land in Winneshiek County fail to comply with the foregoing orders, the Weed Commissioner shall cause this to be done and the expense of said work, including cost of serving notice and other costs, if any, be assessed against the land and the owners there of.

4. Quack grass, where acting as soil binder, may be elminated from the above regulation, per section 317.13.

5. The multiflora rose won't be considered a noxious weed when cultivated for use understock for cultivated roses or as ornamental shrubs in gardens, per section 317.1(2). 6. That the County Auditor be and

is hereby directed to cause notice of the making and entering of the foregoing order by one publication in each of the official newspapers of the county.

Moved by Shatek and seconded by Schmitt to approve the Marv Smith bid of \$10,750.00 to install air conditioning for two classrooms. The board also approved the bid from Mary Smith of \$411.24 to run wiring for the next two rooms as

Carried unanimously. Mr. Jurrens gave an update on the change in the UIC and NEIC conferences. The decisions for many schools are still pending. No changes will be made until the 2023-24 school year.

The 7th and 8th grade levels will use the Illustrative Math program, \$1703.36 plus printing costs. The 9th through 12th grades will use Illustrative Math for Algebra, Geometry, and Algebra II, Savaas for Pre-Calculus, and Next Gen Personal Finance for Math for Daily Living. Total cost to upgrade the math curriculum for grades kindergarten through twelfth grade is .961.01. Carried unanimously.

Moved by Shatek and seconded by Stika to approve the 2022-2023 collective bargaining agreement with the TVEA. 4.3% salary increase for certified staff. Carried

unanimously.

Moved by Shatek and seconded

Fundraising, grants, and the money committed by the board for this project will allow for construction to begin this summer, 2022. Carried unanimously.

Moved by Shatek and seconded by Stika to approve a contract for 2022-2023 with Keystone AEA for AEA staff to be at Turkey Valley approximately 2 days per week to offer support for special education teachers, staff and the principal. Cost of \$39,566.97. Carried unanimously.

Moved by Steinlage and seconded by Stika to approve Melissa Meyer, band director and April Singewald, art teacher, as full time for 2022-2023. Carried unanimously.
